
Over the years as supermarkets appeared, some of those traditional shops closed down and small corner shops selling many of the same things started to appear, often staying open much later than the new supermarkets. As supermarkets stayed open for longer hours and became bigger, widening into other areas of retail, many of the small corner shops disappeared.

As the supermarkets get bigger we will continue to see changes to our traditional shops with many not being able to compete and others changing to suit any niches that the big supermarkets do not want to enter.
